## **State of the Pueblo**

Catalina Pueblo had another great party. We welcomed Halloween madness. The costumes were creative and fun. It always amazes me how super the food is and that there is plenty of everything.

The Lease Committee requested input from the community on the new proposed policy last month. They received two thoughtful suggestions. The committee will meet to review the suggestions before making the final proposal to your Board.

Over the last couple of weeks we have had to replace numerous light bulbs. Unfortunately the heavy rains have contributed to the blown bulbs. Please let me know if your light bulb needs to be replaced.



As you may have noticed from the signs on the gates, the heaters have been turned off at the Minera and Caballo pools. These pools are still serviced on a once a week winter schedule and are still "open" ... but - too cold to enjoy.

As I mentioned in a Newsletter earlier this year, in order to make the best possible plans we decided to postpone the Adelita Pool decking improvements until 2016. We are comparing quotes from several pool contractors for a complete renovation of the pool, including replacement of the pool surface. The existing pool surface is old and badly stained and should be replaced when we have the decking replaced. We will provide additional information to the board regarding the total project cost during the coming months. We are planning to request additional funding in the 2016 budget to supplement the currently budgeted 2015 funding. If all goes as we hope, we will schedule the work for early in the summer of 2016 after Minera and Caballo are heated and usable.

# NOVEMBER GARDEN CHORES:

Sort your frost cloths, stakes and clothespins.

Expect frost starting around Thanksgiving.

Prior to frost, reduce irrigation to encourage dormancy.

Discontinue feeding.

Prepare to move tender plants onto porch or indoors on frosty nights.

Bring tender succulents indoors when nights become cool.

Cease pruning till late February or March.

Sow wildflower seeds; water deeply weekly, till winter rains take over.

Plant deciduous shrubs and trees.

Plant cool-weather vegetables.

Pot up your favorite winter annuals.

Everyone is outdoors now or has windows open; be careful of how much noise you make with garden machines, pets, construction, etc.

# **Garden Gallimaufry Mark Sammons**

What were those purple-blossomed shrubs you saw coming and going and coming again all summer and autumn? They were *Leucophyllum*, a genus of woody perennial shrubs native to the Southwest and adjacent Mexico. While not native to the Sonoran Desert, the shrub's taste for blistering sun, gritty soil, modest water, uncomplaining endurance of reflected heat, winter frost, and tolerance of alkaline soil makes it a wonderful xeriscape selection. There are many varieties to choose from.

Leucophyllum frutescens is nick-named Texas Ranger, a term that in Arizona tends to be applied indiscriminately to the entire genus. This particular one is native to Coahuila and adjacent Texas. Among it's other nicknames are Purple Sage and Texas Rain Sage. There are several cultivars with leaves in shades that range from gray-green to silver to almost white, and flowers in a range of shades from intense pink to lilac to purple.

If you want relief from silver-leaved plants, you might prefer *Leucophyllum laevigatum*, which has the greenest leaves of this genus, and light pink flowers. Its most common nickname is Chihuahuan Sage

Leucophyllum fills a lot of space quickly. With a little supplemental irrigation they will reach shoulder height in four or five years. There are a variety of sizes, none of them very small. L. zygophyllum 'cimaron' is a "dwarf" that reaches 4 to 6 feet! When shopping for your garden, pay close attention to the size information on the label.

There are many other species: *L. langmaniae*, *L. zygophyllum*, *L. candidum*, all with varying shades of leaves and blossoms, and varied forms.



The nickname "rain sage" is indicative of the genus' habit of blooming when heat and humidity are high, typically in the monsoon season, often repeatedly for a few days each time. During last year's mild winter we saw a lot of spontaneous mid-winter bloom.

To sheer or not to sheer is generally a matter of personal taste. If left alone, *Leucophyllum* form a loose and attractive natural shape, and will bloom abundantly, especially if lightly fertilized monthly during the growing season. They bloom on year-old growth, so pruning, pinching or sheering after March 1 reduces bloom. Sheering promotes a speckled or spattered bloom pattern. Sheering makes for a very dense shrub, but *Leucophylum* can never be kept compact. A little judicious pinching in late winter just before new growth beings is sufficient to keep it in bounds.

Plant when dormant in autumn or winter in well-drained native soil. Leucophyllum can also be planted in spring, but this makes surviving their first summer more difficult.

# pueblorecipes

This is a recipe my mother would make for very special occasions. It is simple to prepare, yet very elegant.

# **Veal Cordon Bleu**

8 3-ounce slices of veal from the leg

4 medium-thick slices Gruyère cheese

4 slices prosciutto

1 egg, slightly beaten

fresh bread crumbs

8 tablespoons butter

1 lemon – half juiced and half cut into wedges for garnish

Lay out four veal slices. Place one slice each of Gruyère and prosciutto on each slice of veal. Cover with a remaining slice of veal. Pound the edges to seal. Dip in egg, then fresh bread crumbs; allow to rest on a platter in the refrigerator at least 30 minutes. Melt 4 tablespoons of butter and sauté veal till golden on both sides – about 10 minutes. Remove from fat. (Note: May be done ahead to this point and left at room temperature.) Finish off in a baking dish at 350°F for 10 minutes. When ready to serve, add remaining butter and lemon juice to the pan—heat and pour over veal.

Serves 4.

When buying the cheese for Veal Cordon Bleu, look for Gruyère from Switzerland or France: domestic brands tend to be dry and flavorless. When looking for prosciutto, the only ingredients should be pork and salt. If there are spices, herbs, and other additives, put it back and find one without. Prosciutto should also never be smoky like bacon.
