#### **Report of CPA Financial Review by Eugene Gieseler, CPA resident, April 3, 2014**

Gene was kind enough to review CPA's financials as distributed at the annual meeting of January 29, 2014. He recommended a number of controls regarding expenses and payments, which have now been incorporated, with the CPA at the beginning of 2014 switching to a banking business account at Wells Fargo Bank.

### Pools John Trang



# Garden Gallimaufry

SENNA is, for desert dwellers, one of the first heralds of spring. Its showy bright flowers tell us that spring is imminent, even though there may yet be some frosty nights and gloomy days. It is, for the desert gardener, what forsythia is to the northern gardener. Spring and autumn are good times to plant it.

Senna comprises a genus of several hundred species within the immense leguminous family (Fabaceae), encompassing a range from modestsized herbaceous plants, to shrubs and trees.

Most are native to the tropics of Africa, India, Australia, and the warmest parts of North, Central and South America. Of interest to us are the shrubby kinds, of a scale suitable for our modestly-scaled gardens. They are so widespread in Tucson, brightening medians, parking lots and roadsides, that many people are surprised to learn these are native to the deserts of Australia. They were formerly categorized in the genus cassia.

Silver-leaved senna, Senna phyllodinea The Australian imports in particular are liable to burst into bloom in mild winters, especially if against a warm wall or surrounded by paving. When you plant them, after their first season, ere on the side of too little water. This shrub should never be shorn, as this causes unsightly brushy plants. Let them grow in their natural loose form. If they get too large for your space, you may cut them back to the ground every few years and let them grow anew.





There are several kinds:

Feathery senna, Senna artemisioides, has soft delicate threadlike leaves of a silvery-gray color. It can become six feet high and wide. It will be damaged by temperatures in the low 20s will damage it; it may dies back to the ground, and you'll miss one spring of bloom, but from the roots it will grow anew.

Silver-leaved senna, Senna phyllodinea is thought by some botanists to be a subspeacies of feathery senna, so it is often listed as Senna artemisioides subsp. Petiolaris. It has narrow blade-like silver leaves that look tough and well-suited to the desert. It endures deep cold slightly better than feathery senna. It reaches the same size, six by six size, and ha a slightly more upright form.

There are native sennas too. Senna covesii, found in both the Sonoran and Mojave Deserts, is a somewhat leggy shrub that reaches three or four feet in height. It is deciduous in colder winters and extremely dry summers. It has lovely velvetlike leaves, and blooms in monsoon season. Their mahogany-colored seed pods remain on the plant after splitting and shedding their seeds, and are a pretty if subtle off-season ornament.

Senna wislizeni is native to the Chihuahuan and Sonoran Deserts. It has deep green deciduous leaves, and unlike the others, it is late to leaf and bloom, but does so abundantly.

Plant all senna in well-drained gritty soil; native soil is just fine. Feed annually each spring. Don't overwater; once established, water weekly in hot season, less in a good monsoon season, and infrequently in winter.

# **Mile High Biscuits**

Fresh berries are just beginning to come into season, and there is nothing as good and homey as a fresh fruit shortcake for dessert. This is my mother's recipe for the buscuits.

3 cups flour 2 tablespoons sugar 4½ teaspoon baking powder ¾ teaspoon cream of tartar ¾ teaspoon salt ¾ cup shortening 1 egg, beaten ¾ cup whole milk

Preheat oven to 425°F. Mix dry ingredients, cut in shortening. Combine egg and milk, beat lightly. Add to dry ingredients all at once to make soft dough. Turn onto floured board, knead 15 times. Roll to 1-inch thickness, cut in 2-inch rounds. Place on ungreased baking sheet. Bake for 12-15 minutes.

Makes 12-16 biscuits.

#### **Strawberry Shortcake**

Split Mile High Biscuits and place them in a shallow bowl, with crumbly surfaces facing up. Top with ½ cup macerated strawberries and then dollop them with Crème Chantilly (sweetened whipped cream).

#### **Macerated Strawberries**

1 pint strawberries, washed and hulled granulated sugar, to taste

Slice strawberries into a glass or ceramic bowl. Sprinkle with sugar and let sit for 2-4 hours at room temperatures, stirring once or twice. If not using immediately, cover and refrigerate. (Tip: taste the berries before adding the sugar. If tart or a bit flavorless, you might need more sugar than if you berries are perfectly ripe and flavorful.)

#### **Crème Chantilly**

1 cup heavy whipping cream ½ teaspoon vanilla extract 1 tablespoon (or more, to taste) confectioner's sugar

Place all ingredients in a chilled bowl and, using a hand-held mixer, beat at high speed until cream forms soft peaks. Cover and chill. (If you plan to use the cream for piping from a pastry bag, beat until the stiff peak stage.

#### GARDEN CHORES FOR MAY

- Finish planting cactus, succulents, palms.
- Last chance to plant native perennials and shrubs until fall (when they will succeed better).

Protect newly-planted cacti & succulents from sunburn with shade cloth or cheese cloth through their whole first summer, and remove in mid autumn when sun weakens.
Increase watering; until monsoons come, water inground cactus and succulents once or twice a month, and potted specimens weekly when temperatures are regularly at 90+.

• Dump potted winter annuals, wash pots with bleach solution, and put away till Halloween.

- Continue to increase watering and irrigation until monsoons, especially for plants in containers
- Around Memorial Day, fertilize citrus, fruit trees, roses.
  Your citrus trees will shed fruit they know they can't carry
- through to ripeness; don't panic, this is natural.

• If you like gardening and watering daily in the heat and humidity, for color in a sunny spot plant calibrachoa, celosia, cosmos, golden gleece, marigolds, nierembergia, unias, periwinkle, portulaca, sweet potato vines, and verbena.

• For color in bright shade plant plant begonias, caladium, coleus, dahlias, impatiens.

• For summer vegetables plant tomatoes, peppers, watermelon, eggplant, and squash.

• Don't worry about leaf-cutter bees carving little semicircles out of leaves to take away for their nest; it doesn't hurt the plant, so don't spray.

• Spider mites flourish in dry dusty weather. If you see them, hose down the plant vigorously, and clean up litter from beneath plants. If they get really bad, do careful web research on options, spray when air is still, and let your neighbors know ahead of time so they can close their windows.
