The State of the Pueblo is good. Projects like the Minera pool are nearly complete and we have new plantings at the Adelita Pool. We are going to have a committee look into the choices available for our roads, considering maintenance, replacement or other options. The roads committee will also be lobbying the Board of Supervisors to restore Avenida de Posada which, frankly, is in far worse condition than our interior roads. Our finances are in order and Traci Grabb, the treasurer, is working to further streamline our bookkeeping and to find ways of saving additional funds. The social committee chair, David Scott Allen, is working on imaginative social events for the coming year as well as planning out into 2012. Donn Poll is working on architecture and landscaping and developing forms and procedures for requesting approval for modifications. Jean Paine, in charge of pools, has dived right in and you will see her report in this newsletter. Our secretary, Connie Church, in addition to putting together this newsletter, has been going through reams of records to bring the new board up to speed and has finalized a new resident packet along with other projects. Our vice-president, Russ Carden, has taken on the role of committee coordination and will be working with each committee chair and working as well to bring more members of the community into projects.

Community Development is a big goal of the new board. We have a wealth of skills, talents and interests in our neighborhood that I believe we can share. I have already had a couple of contacts from neighbors who are interested in forming or finding groups in the Pueblo for activities. See David's report on page 2 for a list of suggestions.

Rental issues: This issue continues to grind on. As of this writing, the board continues to consider options for responding to owners' requests for authority to rent, the blatant violation of the existing rule by one new owner and the overall policy concerning rentals of homes in the Pueblo. We would appreciate your input on this if you would send short comments to the board's email address above. The board has to enforce the rules that exist and we believe the rules to be binding on all, validly enacted and in the best interest of the Pueblo. I have met with our attorney in an attempt to examine inexpensive options that will resolve the disputes we now have. I will keep you posted as this issue evolves but would really appreciate your input to our email address. This issue is an important one that will decide the future of the place we call home. My goal is to resolve it without creating or perpetuating divisiveness among us.

## pueblorecipes

### Nußtorte (Nut Torte with Raspberries and Cream)

This has been a favorite of mine ever since I spent a summer playing in an opera orchestra in Heidelberg, Germany.

5 eggs, separated

I cub sugar

7 ounces ground walnuts (2 cups)

I cup bread crumbs

I teaspoon baking powder

2 teaspoons vanilla extract, divided

I cup chilled whipping cream

2 tablespoons confectioner's sugar

1/2 cup seedless raspberry jam

additional confectioner's sugar


Preheat the oven to 325°F. Butter and lightly flour two 8-inch round cake pans. Using an electric hand-held mixer, beat the egg yolks in a large bowl until pale and thick. Slowly add the sugar and continue to beat until well blended. With a sturdy wooden spoon, add the walnuts, bread crumbs, baking powder and I teaspoon vanilla. Mix well – it will be as thick as mud! Beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Lighten the walnut batter by gently mixing in a third of the beaten whites. Carefully fold in the remaining whites, divide among the two cake pans and bake for 30-32 minutes, or until a cake tester comes out clean. Let cool in the pans for 5-10 minutes, then turn out onto racks. When fully cool, use a long serrated knife to cut each of the two layers in half horizontally. Whisk the jam to loosen, and divide between the bottom half of each cake, spreading evenly. Return the top half of each cake. Beat cream, 2 tablespoons of confectioner's sugar and remaining teaspoon vanilla until very thick. Spread all of the cream on top of one of the cake layers, then place remaining cake gently on top so that the cream does not squish out. Chill. Dust the top with confectioner's sugar just before serving.

#### Raspberry Jam

If you wish to make your own raspberry jam, take 2 cups fresh or flash-frozen raspberries (thawed) and put them in a saucepan. Mash them with a wooden spoon and cook for 15 minutes to reduce liquids (may take 20 minutes if using frozen berries). Place a small plate in the freezer (to test jam's doneness). Add 1½ cups sugar and bring to a boil. Boil until thick. Test by placing a small amount on the frozen plate. If it gels and isn't runny, the jam is ready. Strain jam through a fine mesh sieve and cool in a glass jar or ceramic bowl.

Certain subspecies of prickly pear assume a winter hue of lavender or reddish purple. Some yuccas change their leaves from summer green to ribbon-candy stripes. The low winter sun backlights the ruby threads at the edge of certain agaves, and makes the spines of cacti glow with golden light. Slow down, take note, and plan your garden for winter beauty.
