



Have you noticed this plant, and wondered what it is? This shrub of leafless, thornless bare green stems goes by a several nicknames. In Tucson nurseries you will most likely find it labeled pencil tree or pencil cactus, and sometimes firesticks

It is not a cactus; it is a member of the immense world-wide genus Euphorbia, which encompasses such outwardly-dissimilar plants as poinsettia, Moroccan mound, gopher plant, crown-of-thorns, and even baseball plant. Pencil tree's full name is *Euphorbia tirucalli*.

It is native to semi-arid regions of the western Indian Ocean, that is, most of eastern Africa, possibly northward as far as the Horn of Africa and Arabian peninsula. It was introduced by humans to other dry tropical and subtropical places. It was given its Latin species name from the local folk name for it in the Malabar Coast of India, where the plant is called tiru-calli.

It may have been disseminated around the Indian Ocean by Portuguese explorers following their rapid explorations in the late 1490s. More likely it was spread via the coastwise trade stretching from India to the Swahili Coast of eastern Africa for a millennium before European exploration.

Historically, many medical powers were ascribed to the plant's white latex sap, a lore that probably contributed to the plant's promulgation. The sap is, in fact, poisonous and not recommended for any modern medical use. It can sting the skin and burn the eyes; when handling it, wear gloves. That same hazard keeps rodents from nibbling this and all euphorbias.

The plant can grow rapidly, even in adverse conditions. This is partly attributed to its assimilation of CO2 both day and night, unlike most other plants, which do this for only half of their twenty-four-hour cycle. In its native habitat, pencil tree can grow to thirty feet high. In Tucson the tallest I've ever seen is about six or eight feet. With occasional pruning they do very well in pots, where limited root space keeps them even smaller and manageable.

Most pencil trees remain green all year round. The tips of one variety, "rosea," change color



in winter, acquiring shades graduated from green to yellow to orange to coral pink along each terminal branch. This characteristic has given this variety the nickname "firesticks." It turns color only with the combination of short winter days, plus chill, plus full sun. They revert to green in summer. In nurseries, they are not always accurately marked, so if you want to get the colored variety, shop for it in December or January and choose one that already has strong color. At home, they are particularly effective when backlit by the low winter sun.

Pencil stick euphorbia is not hardy in a really deep freeze. But it will make it through light and brief frosts without protection. If you expect hard frost, cover it through the night with a sheet raised on stakes so there is no contact with the stem tips. If a really deep freeze is expected, bring potted specimens in for the night.

This plant is not a cactus, but their culture is essentially identical, whence the folk name pencil cactus. In Tucson, you can plant them in the ground, and give them occasional supplemental water if you notice shriveling of the stems. Or pot them in cactus soil and water them on the same schedule as any other potted succulent: monthly in winter, alternate weeks in the dry spring and fall seasons, weekly in the scorching heat of June, and sparingly during monsoons. If some stem tips brown, wait until they are brittle, then snap them off.

With a little care, pencil stick euphorbia can give you years of enjoyment, and the rosea variety can give you a winter splash of color in a sunny spot.

DECEMBER GARDEN CHORES

Watch for frost Cover tips of tender cacti with styrofoam cups

Cover aloes, citrus, etc. when temps drop below 28°F

Reduce watering desert plants

Water wildflower seedlings weekly

Plant bare-root and deciduous shrubs & trees

Set out winter veggies, flowers, herbs

Test citrus for ripeness and harvest when ready

Clean up plant leaves and litter

Don't prune, except to remove mistletoe

With children and grandchildren coming in for the winter holidays, these griddle cakes are perfect. They are simple enough for the youngest of hands to help, and they bring a sense of nostalgia to us older folk. For the syrup, Gramma always used her own homemade maple syrup but, nowadays, there are many options including our local prickly pear syrup!



Gramma's Griddle Cakes

1¼ cups flour 2¼ teaspoons baking powder ½ teaspoon salt 1 cup milk 1 egg

Mix dry ingredients. Add milk and egg and stir until dry ingredients are kist moistened. Cook on a medium griddle (350°F) until bubbles appear on top and pop. Flip and cook until done. If you prefer thinner pancakes, add a little more milk until you have the right consistency.

Makes 5 five-inch griddle cales. For a larger recipe, double all ingredients excpet the egg.
