The mission of the Architecture Committee is to support the community's desire to maintain the architectural character of the complex and guide efforts to properly maintain the structures within its boundaries in concert with the Landscape Committee, using the Rules and CC&R's of the Catalina Pueblo Association for authority under the auspices of the Catalina Pueblo Association Board.


We divide the Pueblo into four quadrants: Red, Blue, Purple and Yellow. Each year, members of the Landscape and Architecture Committees separately walk two different quadrants. Earlier this year in the Spring, the Blue Quadrant was reviewed and Owners of the subject properties within that zone were notified of conditions on their properties that needed to be addressed per the Rules and CC&R's.

This Fall (mid-November) the 27 properties in the Purple Zone were reviewed separately by members of the Landscape and Architecture Committees. Formerly, the two committees sent out a combined letter listing condition issues needing attention. This year the chairs of the two committees (Joey Barbee for Landscape and myself for Architecture) decided to communicate these condition issues separately in an attempt to avoid confusion.

We (the Architecture Committee) are asking homeowners to have the corrective items completed within 45 days or by January 15, 2022. The committees will perform follow-up reviews shortly after that deadline. Owners having difficulty getting their issues taken care of by the January 15, 2022 deadline may request an extension of time to have the work done.

Please accept these thanks, in advance, for your cooperation and support of our efforts to preserve and enhance Catalina Pueblo as one of the premier townhome properties in Tucson.

DECEMBER GARDEN CHORES

Watch for frost If hard freeze predicted cover tips of tender cacti

Cover aloes, citrus, etc. when temps drop below 28°F

Reduce watering desert perennials to monthly

Water wildflower seedlings weekly

Plant bare-root and deciduous shrubs & trees

Set out winter-hardy veggies, flowers, herbs

Test citrus for ripeness and harvest when ready Clean up plant leaves and litter

Don't prune yet, except to remove mistletoe

Garden Gallimaufry Mark Sammons

The holiday season always feels a bit more festive when paperwhite narcissus are blooming on the windowsill. They are even more cheering after the holiday lights and decorations come down.

The genus *Narcissus* includes daffodils, and is generally associated with spring gardens in the North, but some genera are amenable to being forced to bloom early on the windowsill. Easiest of these is paperwhites, *Narcissus papyraceus*.

The narcissus genus is native to both shores of the Mediterranean. They prefer chilly winters, but not deep freeze.

Narcissus form their leaves and flowers within the bulb, while underground. If you were to slice a bulb from top to bottom, you would see inside them the miniature, ghostly forms of these. If you want to sacrifice a bulb to a home science class, slice and compare it with charts you can find on the web.

Forcing paperwhites indoors starts with choosing specially-prepared bulbs. These are grown in nurseries under ideal conditions then dug, dried, cleaned, and and sold expressly for indoor forcing (though they will work perfectly well in the ground if the ground does not freeze solid).

I've found that bulbs from the Big Box stores and hardware stores are substandard; they produce leaves but often fail to bloom, or barely bloom. Buy from a reputable nursery, pay a bit more, to avoid disappointment.

As paperwhites need no advance chilling before forcing, they can be planted directly from the store. I've planted them outdoors in Tucson, and they bloomed successfully. But it is pleasant to have them indoors, up at nose level.

For this, they can be planted in pots of soil, or in gravel. If planting in soil, use a quick-draining soil such as bagged cactus soil, in a pot with drainage holes. Put an inch or two of soil below the bulbs, then cover with more soil till just the tips of the bulbs are visible. Water regularly so the roots are constantly moist but not soggy. The advantage of planting in soil is that its weight counteracts top-heaviness as the plants grow. Three or five in a pot look great.

An alternative is to plant paperwhites in gravel. I've used bagged marble chips, bagged polished river stones, even gravel from the ground. If using any of these, thoroughly rinse out dust, soak in a mild chlorine solution, then drain, rinse, and dry before use.

Growing paperwhites in pebbles requires a container that does not drain. Allow two or three inches of pebbles below the bulb, then add more pebbles till just the bulb tips are exposed. Next, add water until the water covers only the bottom third of the bulbs. After that, keep this level constant by checking it regularly. For this method, I enjoy using a heavy clear glass container, so I can watch the roots grow. (This too is a great home science activity).

Set them in your sunniest window. The roots will grow first, then green shoots will emerge. As growth proceeds they will consume more water. When the first flower bud emerges, move them to your coolest bright window to prolong the bloom period.

The further into winter you start them, the faster they will come into bloom. If you start a new container every two weeks, you can have some in bloom from Thanksgiving through March.

As they bloom, the flower stems will tilt toward the light source. Resist the temptation to rotate them, as they seem to become confused and the flower stems flop over. If they flop, don't despair; just cut them and put them in a vase.

Plants grown in gravel are unlikely to regenerate enough strength to bloom in a future year; just discard them after bloom. If you like a challenge, you can move pot-grown plants to a sunny spot, and feed and water them regularly until the leaves yellow and brown off, then let them dry. Resume watering and feeding in the autumn. They may need to grow leaves for a few winters to regain bloom strength, but it is fun to see them come back into bloom eventually.

There are also yellow varieties such as Grand Soleil d'Or and Winter Sun that require the identical care, and have different rich scents. With any kind, paperwhites are a simple New Years treat.

Chocolate Shortbread Squares

7 3/4 ounces flour 2 1/4 ounces unsweetened cocoa 16 tablespoons unsalted butter, room temperature 3 7/8 ounces granulated sugar

Whisk flour and cocoa together in a bowl and set aside. Using a stand mixer with the paddle attachment, cream the butter on medium speed until light fluffy. Add the sugar and continue to beat until very pale. Stop the mixer; add the flour and cocoa mixture and combine on low speed, until it forms a slightly dry dough. Turn out the dough onto a sheet of wax paper and form it into a square log 14 inches long and 1 1/2 inches in diameter. I use a dough scraper to help me form the log. Wrap tightly in the wax paper and chill the dough for at least 1 hour.

Line two cookie sheets with parchment. Using a very sharp knife, cut the dough into 1/4-inch thick slices. Arrange the slices on the parchment an inch or more apart. Place cookies sheets in the freezer for 10 minutes; preheat oven to 325°F. Remove cookie sheets from the freezer and bake shortbreads for 18 minutes. Let them cool on the baking sheets for 10 minutes, until they are firm enough to remove with a spatula. Then remove them to a cooling rack to finish cooling.

Makes 4 dozen.

These not-too-sweet shortbreads are a favorite when it comes to holiday cookie baking and gifting. Maybe you should give yourself a little gift and make a batch just for you!?
