CPA social gatherings are an important attraction of our Catalina Pueblo community. With the reduction of Covid-19's dangers and building on the success of the Cinco de Mayo pool party, we are scheduling a Fall function at the Adelita pool. We look forward to catching up with longtime residents and greeting new owners.

I am continually struck by how the repaving of Avenida de Posada has enhanced the visual entry to our community from that street. However, the last-minute timing of Pima County's decision to include Posada gave us little notice of the project and no opportunity to affect design issues, such as mitigation of increased traffic speeds.

The Board has initiated the County's process for the preparation of a "neighborhood traffic management plan" which could include "traffic calming" measures such as speed humps on Posada. The first step in that process is establishing a representative committee of affected owners to interact with County staff and obtaining petition signatures of at least 60% of owners with vehicular access to Posada. We will be formalizing the committee and passing petitions in the coming months.

After reviewing your comments and incorporating many of your suggestions, the Board has approved revisions to Sections 1 through 9 of the Catalina Pueblo Association Rules. In November the Board will consider proposed revisions to the remaining Sections 10 through 12.

The revised Rules and an accompanying summary/explanation of the substantive changes will be emailed to all homeowners. My thanks to our Rules Revision Committee who labored on this effort for the past three years and to all of you who took the time to review the draft revisions and give us your comments.



Treasurer Report

In 2020, we purchased a 24-month Certificate of Deposit at Pima Federal Credit Union (PFCU) for \$25,000, putting our money to work to increase our Reserve Fund. After much investigation of Banks and Credit Unions, we selected PFCU because it offered the highest APY for the small business category of Home Owners Associations. The APY of 0.75%, offered at that time, was the best we could do.

After a review of October 2022 rates offered by other Banks and Credit Unions, I am pleased to report that PFCU says that the roll-over for this CD, which matures 10/19/2022, will increase to an APR of 3.0%. This is a higher rate than any other identified institution.

On October 12, the Board voted to roll-over our PFCU CD.



IT'S THAT TIME AGAIN!

For those of you new to the Pueblo, and those of you longer term owners who may need a reminder, the Architecture and Landscape Committees, under the authority of the Board, conduct biennial property condition reviews of properties in each of the four quadrants shown in the attached map. This Fall, we will be conducting reviews in the Red Quadrant, having already reviewed the Yellow Quadrant in the Spring.

Do you live in that RED QUADRANT?

November is the month, this year, that the
Architectural and Landscape Committees will be
walking by your property for their "Walk About"
inspections. The Architectural "inspections"
are only for exterior appearance issues and do
not constitute an engineering assessment which
would focus on structural condition issues such
as spalling or otherwise deteriorating adobe,
wood structural members, etc. Engineering
assessments should be obtained by the property
owners if they become aware of any issues such
as cracking concrete, deteriorating wooden
structural members (such as the outdoor patio
roof framing members) and the like. The

Landscape reviews focus on maintenance issues with existing plantings and any significant plantings which may have been made without approval of the Landscape Committee. As a further reminder, any exterior modification to the structure(s) and significant plantings must obtain approval of the respective Architecture or Landscape Committees. Modifications to "Hardscape" elements (Walks, Patios, Driveway paving, etc.) either individually or in combination with Landscaping work are reviewed jointly by both committees.

The RED QUADRANT often gets high marks during the initial walk as well as the follow-up walk when we check on the status of the requested remedial work. So have a look now and get a head start on keeping up your fine reputation!

Garden Gallimaufry

Violets may seem utterly out of place in the desert. They prefer rich soil, constant moisture, shade, and cool temperatures, four conditions that don't come naturally here. But – and there is always a "but" – any gardener can be tempted by the unusual, the sentimental, or the challenging.

Violets are tough in the right conditions. In damper and cooler climates, they will endure through generations of neglect wherever anyone has ever gardened. I've seen them blooming in the wild at the edge of a snowfield in scree high in the Alps.

Violets are all in the immense genus *Viola*. Not all have perfume; the scented ones are Viola odorata. When succumbed to temptation when we saw the latter for sale at Rillito Nursery, and decided to give them a try. The fussing is more than offset by their intimate charm.

In brief, you must trick the violets by using our cool winters to mimic the cool moist spring season of their native habitat. Acquire a plant as cool autumn weather approaches. Transplant it into a pot twice or thrice the diameter of the nursery pot, and plant it in rich dark potting soil. Place it in very bright shade while it acclimates, and keep it moist year-round.

Feed it on half-strength fertilizer alternate weeks year-round. Regular watering leaches nutrients out of the soil. Yellowing leaves remind you to feed them a bit more.

Once the days cool off in November, move the pot to a spot that gets a couple of hours of direct morning sun then goes into shade. If they are getting too much sun too soon, they

will tell you by crisping of the leaf edges. The leaves will droop spectacularly if they get too dry. If these happen, violets will spring back quickly if you water them abundantly and adjust the sun exposure. As the season cools, allow progressively more sun (up to half a morning). In late February, as the days grow longer and warmer, reverse the sun/shade ratio until they are in bright shade all day.

Although violet roots are very cold-hardy, on frosty nights I cover mine or move the pot into the laundry room to preserve the upper growth. If the tops freeze, they will grow back from the roots, but this will delay blossoming considerably.

The shy blossoms often appear beneath the leaves, so it requires a little peaking (and sniffing) to fully enjoy them. I keep my pots on a wall close to nose level. Pluck off faded blossoms at the base of their stems to prevent going to seed and encourage more blossoms. The accompanying photo was taken in early January.

Violets almost perpetually produce new foliage. In early summer, the edges of leaves will singe. That is a signal to shear back the whole plant, easily done with scissors, and move it to shade. By this time, the root crown will likely have filled its pot to capacity, so shearing season is a good time to pop it out of its pot, slice it vertically into quarters, and repot each root crown in its own pot. Keep them moist, and new leaves will come back quickly. By late summer, they may again have crowded their pots, so you can sheer, divide, and repot again. The following winter and into spring they will bloom again.

Enjoy the challenge!

OCTOBER GARDEN CHORES

Reduce watering to harden perennial plants for winter.

Plant cool-season annuals, vegetables, herbs, flowers.

> Plant trees, shrubs, perennials in fall.

Divide overgrown perennials in fall or winter.

Cease planting new cacti & succulents.

Inventory your frost cloths for the arrival of frost.

Move cold-sensitive tropical succulents indoors when nights drop below 50.

> Sow desert wildflower seeds.

> > Divide perennials.

Early in month, last fertilizing of in-ground perennials until spring.

Easy Lavash Pizzettas

Margherita Pizzetta

1 lavash bread (Trader Joe)
1/4 cup tomato sauce (passata)
3/4 cup shredded mozzarella cheese
16 fresh basil leaves
olive oil

Greek-esque Pizzetta

1 lavash bread (Trader Joe)
1/4 cup tomato sauce (passata)
red pepper flakes
1/2 cup feta cheese, crumbled
12 kalamata olives, piited, halved
fresh basil and oregano leaves

For both versions shown above: Preheat oven to 425°F. Line a baking tray (preferably rimmed) with parchment paper. Place the lavash on the parchment and drizzle bread with the tomato sauce. Use a spatula to spread the sauce evenly over the lavash leaving a 1/2-inch border. (Too much sauce will make your pizzetta soggy.) After the sauce goes on, add your toppings. For the Margherita, sprinkle evenly with the mozzarella and then top with basil leaves. Drizzle with olvie oil. For the Greek-esque pizza, sprinkle the sauce with red pepper flakes, then the feta cheese, olive halves, and herbs. For both pizzettas, bake for 10 minutes. Let cool a minute or two, cut in quarters, and serve. Serves 2 as a light lunch. (See the sidebar for more topping ideas.)
