## The Greatest Hunter of the Whole World: The Dragonfly Pat Weigand



After seeing some of these colorful creatures in my yard at the end of last Summer, out of curiosity, I did a bit of reading about them.

This is what I found:

Dragonflies are surprisingly efficient fliers and deadly hunters. With a kill rate of 95%, they are the most efficient hunters of the animal kingdom (for contrast, lions' kill rates are about 30%, and the best mammal land hunters, African wild dogs, reach only 80%).

I was amazed when I read this!

Behind the dragonflies' success are their quite advanced brains. Although their brains are not structurally the same as mammals, their functions are surprisingly mammal-level.

- They can pick out a single target from a swarm of insects and latch on to them, much like a lion latches on to a single zebra from a herd, or how a fielder can track the movement of a ball against the multicolored, moving background of the audience in a stadium. They do this by filtering out all other useless information, such as the background and other insects.
- Their brains harbor some of the best flight engines. Since dragonflies hunt other flying insects, agility is key. To aid in this, dragonflies can move and rotate each of their four wings independently. Thanks to this unique ability, they can fine-tune their flying so well that they can fly fast, bank hard, fly backwards, fly upside-down and even fly with a wing or two missing or torn. They can even have downward thrust for sudden dives faster than falling. Their muscles are attached directly to their wings which allows them to fly faster than other insects. They can also hover and pivot in place.
- They can predict with great accuracy the path of their target's flight. They keep themselves pointed at their prey in such a way that they're in line with their original position from the target's point of view, so while they appear to grow larger as they approach, they don't otherwise seem to move. This is called 'motion camouflage.'
  - The area of a dragonfly's head is composed primarily of its enormous compound eyes,



which contain 30,000 facets, each bringing in information about the insect's surroundings. Dragonflies have nearly 360-degree vision, with just one blind spot directly behind them.

This extraordinary vision is one reason why they're able to keep a watch on a single insect within a swarm and go after it while avoiding midair collisions with other insects in the swarm.

Dragonflies do not have stingers. They do have sharp mandibles, but they are not usually sharp enough to cut through human skin. Luckily, dragonflies are not aggressive and have no reason to attack a human, besides self-defense.

The largest dragonfly species is the Giant Darner *(Anax walsinghami)*, whose body length and wingspan can both reach five inches. These can be found in Central America and the U.S. Southwest.

Dragonflies help humans by controlling populations of pest insects, especially those that threaten us most, such as mosquitoes and biting flies. A single dragonfly can eat anywhere between 30 and hundreds of mosquitoes per day.

Dragonflies also inspire us to create new technology—from drones to artificial visual systems—because of their incredible flight skills and vision.

#### **APRIL GARDEN CHORES**

Prune frost-damaged wood when new leaf buds appear.

Many evergreen trees shed old yellowed leaves in spring; it's normal!

Plant cactus and succulents, citrus and palms.

Plant bougainvillea, lantana, zinnias, portulaca, periwinkle.

Plant tomatoes, peppers, melons, thyme, oregano, marjoram, basil, and rosemary.

"Tree" is also a misnomer; after many years it can develop a short trunk as the lower leaves die off. Its peak height is only six to ten feet, and it takes a long time to attain that height. It keeps producing its long evergreen new leaves from the center crown. They gradually arch outward and bow downward.

The plant's width reaches about six feet. It looks at home inside or outside the patio wall. For two years I've had a couple of these plant out in front of the house, along a regular javalina route, and they have shown no interest in eating them. Not yet, anyway.

Mexican tree grass is native to the Chihuahuan Desert, so it is well suited to the extremes of our local climate. Plant it in full sun, in gritty well-drained native soil. In its first summers, water it deeply weekly to get it established, monthly once established. The tips of the long leaves may brown off, but the plant will be fine as long as most of the long slim leaves are green. As the lowest leaves brown off, snip them away to keep the plant looking nice and discourage rat habitat. It can be a handsome plant for many years to come.

**APRIL GARDEN CHORES - continued** 

Cease planting other things for the year.

By the end of the month, potted plants (other than succulents) will need daily watering. Bigger pots hold moisture longer.

Fertilize shrubs.

Gradually increase irrigation quantity and/or frequency as temperatures rise.

Let wildflowers dry and go to seed; shake out seeds and rake away dried remains.

In tropical plants like citrus, iron chlorosis causes yellow leaves with bright green veins. Treat affected plants with dilute chelated iron.

Wash aphids and spider mites from tender new growth with a strong blast of water. Failing that, use insecticidal soap, or move on to cautious spot-use of houseplant spray.

If you see dry rot (black areas) on prickly pear pads, remove and discard the plant.

# Simple French Onion Soup

- 2 large yellow sweet onions
- 2 large red onions
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter, softened
- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 teaspoons all-purpose flour
- 4 cups chicken (or beef) stock
- 1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt

- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard 2 thyme sprigs, leaves only
- 2 tablespoons Cognac
- 4 (1/2-inch-thick) slices baguette
- 1/2 cup grated Gruyère cheese
- 1/2 cup grated Emmental cheese

Halve the onions pole-to-pole, then slice into 1/2-inch-thick slices. In a Dutch oven or heavy soup pot over medium-low heat, melt the butter and oil, then add the onions, and cook very slowly, for about 30 minutes, until they take on a brown color.

Sprinkle the onions with flour, and stir well to coat. Pour in the stock and bring to a boil. Reduce the heat to maintain a simmer and stir in the salt, mustard, thyme, and Cognac. Keep the soup at a simmer.

Preheat the broiler. Place the baguette slices on a baking sheet, divide the Gruyère and Emmental cheeses over the top of the bread slices and broil, watching carefully, until the cheese is melted and bubbly.

Ladle the soup into four bowls and top with baguette slices to serve. Serves 4.

This is a simple version of French Onion Soup. Maybe not the one Julia Child would offer but the style a French mother or grandmother might make. As with any recipe for onion soup, the longest part is cooking the onions: low and slow.
