Garden Gallimaufry

Mark Sammons

After writing 150 gardening articles, I'll wrap up this series where I got my personal start in desert gardening - The Tucson Botanical Gardens. When I still lived in Maine and knew I'd be moving to Tucson, I happened to have a business conference here. I dashed to the Gardens and bought a stack of books on desert gardening. I spent the following winter reading every page multiple times, trying to imagine translating my lifetime hobby into such an alien new environment.

We spent our first year in Tucson in an apartment. The balcony had room for some potted plants, where I got to make my first desert gardening mistakes and successes. While we house hunted, I repeatedly returned to the Tucson Botanical Gardens, where I photographed plants (and their labels!), and researched their origins and preferred conditions

By the time we found our Pueblo house, with its barren and scorched patios, I was ready to dig in. My garden became a sort of learning lab, as anyone who has seen it knows; it is a chaotic hodgepodge. Book learning is extremely valuable but differs from hands-on experience; I lost about a third of what I first planted. Mistakes: I planted in spring; I panicked and overwatered; I learned about cactus sunburn and shade screen for new plants; and learned which plants just wouldn't survive in the microclimate within our walls.

There were successes too, which I credit to the Tucson Botanical Gardens. For its founders, the Gardens were something of a learning lab too, and it continues today as an educational institution as well as a delight to visit. It started in 1929 when Rutger Porter, a local landscaper, purchased a ranch on the site of today's garden and started a nursery. He had a particular interest in native cacti. He eventually married a client's daughter,

Bernice Walkley Porter. She was a newcomer to town, with a botany degree from Vassar. Together they experimented with what would survive in Tucson... with enough water from the ranch's old cattle tank. Evidence of those experiments survives today in the shady oasis area around the ranch house, where you'll see Asian citrus, nandina, and jasmine; Middle Eastern Aleppo pine and pomegranate; Mediterranean chaste tree and myrtle. In time, their housekeeper Edna Johnson encouraged the addition of culinary plants, the impetus for the herb collection.

The Porters closed the commercial nursery in 1958; Rutger died in 1964, the same year a Tucson Botanical Garden was founded elsewhere in Tucson. The property was eventually transferred to them, and became the ever-growing and ever-changing nonprofit garden we enjoy today. It is organized in sections according to plant types, biomes, origins, plant uses, and ethnography. It includes a greenhouse for tropical plants and butterflies, an education building, classes, changing art exhibits, a gift shop, bookstore, and a cafe. There is even a new garden with working model trains to bring out the kid in all of us. Pay a visit, learn, take guests, have fun, be inspired!



The Tucson Botanical Gardens is open year round 2150 North Alvernon Way, on the east side of the road.

During current road construction, it is easiest to loop around on Glenn and approach form the south, heading northward.



COCOA LAVENDER 6 ounces very cold, organic prime sirloin

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

1 teaspoon snipped chives, plus extra

1 1/2 teaspoons capers, chopped

1 teaspoon minced shallot

2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce

sea salt & freshly ground pepper, to taste

1 very fresh organic egg yolk

Begin by chopping the beef. You can use a meat grinder, but chopping it by hand gives a better texture. Cut the beef into very thin strips, then each strip into matchsticks, then into a fine dice. Chill the chopped beef until you are ready to serve.

Mix together the mustard, chives, capers, shallot, and Worcestershire sauce in a small bowl. When ready to serve, mix this thoroughly into the beef, and season with salt and pepper. Press the mixture into a 4-inch ring mold on a plate. Using a round measuring tablespoon, make a large indentation in the middle of the beef. Remove the ring mold, carefully tip the egg yolk into the indentation, sprinkle with chives, and serve with toasts and extra salt on the side. Serves 2
