A quick reminder that removal of trees, shrubs, or specimen cacti requires advance application to and approval from the board, just as does planting.

Whether removing or adding, start by first reviewing your ideas with the Board's landscape chair, Mark Sammons, who can walk you through the process. His contact information is: cookfarm@comcast.net or 520-603-0465

Additionally, November is the moment to cut back desert broom (*Baccharis sarothroides*) easily identifiable while in bloom. Although it is native, its pollen is highly allergenic. So, check your alleys and washes and cut it down as a kindness to your neighbors. It produces bright green whips and whitish blooms that are either small tassel shapes or fluffy (depending on whether the plant is female or male). Lightbulb Committee

Deb Perry, Vice President

Catalina Pueblo maintains a consistent architectural style, and part of this tradition includes an identical lamp post at the front of each home. These lamp posts are designed to turn on automatically at dusk and off at dawn. The community provides both the light bulbs and their replacements when needed, ensuring that the lamp posts remain operational throughout the year. A team of resident volunteers monitors the lamp posts along the various streets of the neighborhood.

This is how it works ...

The Co-Chairs order and store the bulk of the light bulbs and cans of compressed air and re-order when necessary. Receipts are given to the Board Treasurer for reimbursement. Co-Chairs also provide the Team with supplies, a few light bulbs and a couple of cans of compressed air. Team members monitor the lamp posts on their designated street(s) and notify residents whose lights are not working. Residents, please keep an eye on your own lamp posts and contact your designated Team member with any outage. New bulbs are provided by the Team members. The cans of compressed air for the Team are used to blow debris out of the light socket, as often the bulb is fine, but the contact point is obstructed by leaves and dirt that has blown in.

Occasionally, this is not an easy fix. When that occurs, residents are advised it is their responsibility to contact an electrician to diagnose the problem of a non-functioning light, then replace the sensor or socket in the lamppost, or other issues.

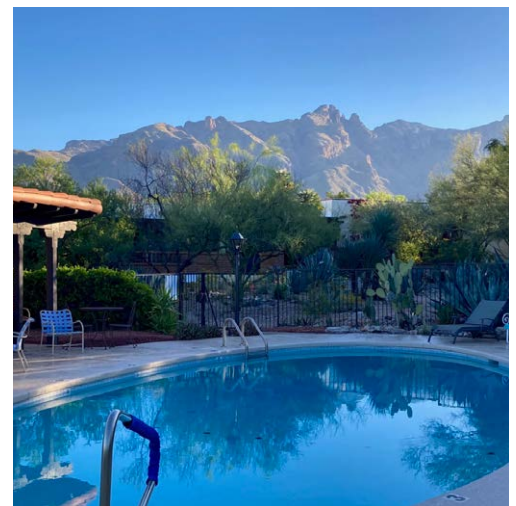

Benefit 2: Volunteering is good for your mind and body

This recipe came from a wonderful French restaurant in Ensenada, México — Il Re Sol. The founder was the daughter of a French engineer and his Mexican wife. The wife and daughter were sent back to France to avoid the cholera epidemic and, while there, the daughter attended the Cordon Bleu.

She returned to México and started Il Re Sol. Her son now runs it; it is still amazing, though now it offers a fusion of French and Mexican cuisines.



Mussels in Saffron-Wine Cream

2 tablespoons unsalted butter
1 cup chopped sweet onion
1 shallot, chopped
1/2 teaspoon saffron threads

1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup white wine
1 pound cultivated mussels
1/2 cup heavy cream

Scrub and debeard the mussels; discard any that are broken or open. In a large saucepan, melt butter and cook onion and shallot over medium heat until soft and clear, but not browned – about 5 minutes. Add the saffron and salt and stir until saffron begins to diffuse its color and flavor – about 30 seconds. Add the wine and bring to a boil. Add mussels and cover; cook over high heat for 3-5 minutes until mussels have all opened. Pour broth through sieve and return mussels to the broth. Add cream and bring just to a boil. Serve with a crusty French bread and a crisp white wine.

Serves 2 as a main course, 4 as a starter or soup course
